Volcanoes are normally found close to where tectonic plates meet. Tectonic plates are huge slabs of rock that make up the Earth's crust.

Many are around the Pacific Ocean which is called 'Ring of Fire'. However some volcanoes are in the middle of tectonic plates such as in Hawaii and Iceland.

Volcanoes can be **active** (could erupt at any time), **dormant** (hasn't erupted for a long time) or **extinct** (very unlikely to erupt again). Some volcanoes are tall like a cone and other volcanoes are wider and flatter like a shield.
